

For the fifth time in history, Croatia reached the FIFA World Cup - a tenth major competition! I would like to express my gratitude to all of you who work hard in clubs, counties, and football centres, as well as in HNS headquarters, for your contribution, effort, energy, knowledge, and desire to participate in all football activities.

Let us keep up the good work in 2018!

CROATIA IN 2017: UP AND DOWN AND OFF TO WORLD CUP

This year, Croatia national football team has been through some turbulent times, including a managerial change, but ultimately managed to accomplish its mission secure the FIFA World Cup berth.

First days of 2017 saw Croatia visiting China Cup in Nanning, without its superstars, drawing 1:1 with South American champions Chile and host nation China only to lose in both penalty shootouts. However, Ante Čačić's men, not usually in the spotlight, performed very well, with Franko Andrijašević and Luka Ivanušec finding the net. Ivanušec thus became the youngest Croatia goalscorer in history.

The qualifying path towards Russia

was continued in March at Maksimir Stadium, when Croatia finally enjoyed home fans' support and defeated Shevchenko's sturdy Ukraine 1:0, courtesy of Nikola Kalinić's goal. Four days later, a friendly international was played in Estonia, but alongside a 3:0 loss came a serious injury of Marko Pjaca.

In late May, in its North American premiere, Croatia brought joy to local supporters as the players available at a non-FIFA date overcame a strong Mexican side 2:1. Duje Čop and Fran Tudor were on target.

Later in June, in one of the key European Qualifiers, the Vatreni visited Reykjavik to face Iceland. A tough encounter produced no goals

until the 90th minute, when resourceful Magnusson scored to win all three points for the hosts, complicating the situation in Group I. Ultimately, this moment marked the beginning of a tournaround that witnessed the Northern EURO 2016 sensation booking a direct ticket to Russia.

However, Čačić's selection still had everything in their own hands at the start of September and October deciders, and the first step in the right direction was a difficult win over Kosovo in Zagreb. Unusually, this match was abandoned in the first half due to heavy rain and resumed the next day. In these demanding conditions, it was Domagoj Vida (1:0) who broke the opponents' resistance.

Little over 50 hours later, Croatia had to visit the partisan atmosphere of Eskisehir, Turkey. The Vatreni coped excellently with fatigue and very motivated hosts, even with a major referee's oversight, and created some chances, but it was Tosun on 75 minutes who beat Danijel Subašić and compromised Croatia's plans.

Finland then came to Rijeka, instead of originally scheduled Osijek due to pitch condition, and was left with no other choice but to win. Mario Mandžukić's opener was a significant relief, with Juventus striker reaching No. 2 at Croatia's all-time goalscorers list. That was his 30th goal, while Davor Šuker leads with 45. Nonetheless, in the closing minutes Soiri levelled the score, triggering the termination of Ante Čačić's contract. His replacement, Zlatko Dalić, took the national team towards a formidable challenge in Kyiv. It was necessary to win at Ukraine in order to reach the play-offs.

Andrej Kramarić assumed the heroof-the-day role at the NSC Olimpiyskiy, scoring a brace in a 2:0 victory, but the entire team deserved praise for a brave and efficient quality performance in the gravest of moments, especially in the second half. Following the play-off draw, Croatia had to prepare for the familiar face of always inconvenient Greece.

As the qualifying campaign was coming to a close, the stage was set for Croatia's finest hour. Extraordinary performance in the first leg, at the sold-out Maksimir Stadium, crowned a brilliant night in Zagreb. Croatia won 4:1, with captain Luka Modrić and cheeky Nikola Kalinić quickly securing a two-goal lead. Papastathopoulos halved the deficit, only for Ivan Perišić and Andrej Kramarić to respond with two more goals.

Croatia cold-bloodedly held on to a goalless draw in the return leg at the passionate Karaiskakis Stadium in Piraeus. Ivan Perišić missed the winner by an inch - his excellent drive hit the woodwork, but the entire nation could once again celebrate with its footballers: Croatia will play at its fifth World Cup! In the final days of 2017, the Vatreni can start to prepare for the most prestigious of tournaments, where they will face Messi's Argentina, talented Nigeria, and anew Iceland. The draw does seem tough, but considering the introductory performances of Dalić's Croatia, it could be even tougher for Croatia's rivals...

LUKA MODRIĆ BEST MIDFIELDER IN THE WORLD

Even though 2016 has already been Luka Modrić's dream year, in 2017 Croatia captain was thoroughly recognized as one of the best footballers worldwide.

The wizard from Zadar has continued to win trophies with Real Madrid, simultaneously earning numerous individual prizes, playing a key role on the international level as he led Croatia towards the FIFA World Cup in Russia.

Through excellent midfield displays, he contributed to winning the Spanish league title - Modrić's first - with Real Madrid ending a five-year drought, followed by a Spanish Supercup title.

Real Madrid managed to defend the Champions League trophy - another historic feat, with Modrić assisting in the impressive final against Juventus again followed by a second successive European Supercup title.

For the fifth consecutive year, Modrić has won «The Football award» as the best Croatian player, and has once again been included in the Champions League team of the season, this time as the best midfielder of the competition. At the FIFA The Best Award ceremony, Modrić has been included in the World 11, yet Modrić's reputation in the world of football is probably best described through the player of the years selections: UEFA has ranked him fourth, FIFA sixth, while the respectable France Football ranked him fifth as they gave the famous Ballon d'Or. Modrić was trailing only the untouchable trio of Messi, Ronaldo, and Neymar, or Buffon and Ramos, but the overall winner - Portuguese Cristiano Ronaldo - selected Modrić as

the best player in the world, casting his vote.

Besides, Modrić is nominated to defend his place in the UEFA Team of the Year, and in the final days of 2017 he expandend his trophy collection, as Real Madrid managed to defend the FIFA Club World Cup title. Modrić also won the Golden Ball, the award for the most outstanding player of the tournament - one step above the double goalscorer Ronaldo. His status as one of the idols in the powerhouse of Real Madrid has also been confirmed this summer as the took over the mythical No. 10 jersey. Thus, he joined the legends such as Figo, Michael Laudrup, or Clarence Seedorf.

"Luka Modrić is one of the best midfielders of all time", said the legendary striker and Ukraine manager Andriy Shevchenko without delay. "At Real Madrid, we'll cry when he retires", added Predrag Mijatović.

A very special moment for Croatia captain was the October World Cup qualifier with Finland, when he celebrated his international jubilee, a 100th national team cap. "My dream was to wear the Croatia jersey at least once. This jubilee is beyond all expectations", said the emotional Modrić, at the same time overjoyed with the birth of his third child.

In Croatia's Club 100, he joined Šimić, Olić, Šimunić, Pletikosa and his previous captain Srna, with the upcoming World Cup setting a great stage for a great players, presenting him with the opportunity to leave even a deeper mark in the national team.

CROATIA WINS UEFA REGIONS' CUP, YOUNGSTERS STAY ON COURSE



Besides the Vatreni, other Croatia national teams have also had an eventful and interesting year, one that saw Croatia triumphant in the UEFA Regions' Cup.

In July, Croatia was represented by the selection of Football Centre Zagreb, who won silver medal two years ago. This time, they have returned wearing - gold. In the final match, Croatia faced Republic of Ireland once again. However, it was Adžić strike that decided the outcome (1:0).

The Croatian team has reached the final competing with Portugal, Ukraine and host nation Turkey. "Ten beautiful days. What is impressive is that we have drawn in the first match, and then won the remaining three games", said Croatia manager Tomislav Gričar.

"I can only praise our camp, our attitude, our performance, and finally, our celebrations on return journey and later in Zagreb. I believe we have 20 more amateur players who deserved to be here. The quality of Croatian amateur football is very high, our leagues are excellent, and winning the domestic qualifiers was probably the most difficult task", he added. In 2017, Croatia U-21 national team has started another qualifying campaign, for the EURO 2019 in Italy and San Marino. Gračan's youngsters are staying well on course, considering convincing wins over Moldova, San Marino and top seeds Czech Republic, as well as brilliant comeback win in added time over Belarus, and a 1:1 draw away at top rivals Greece.

Croatia U-19, led by head coach Milin, was tested in March in the Elite Round in Portugal. A dramatic set of events saw young Croatians finish second, just a step behind the hosts. Later in the year, the new head coach Jarni took the U-19s into the new campaign. The Qualifying Round tournament was held in Rovinj, with Croatia meeting Denmark, Latvia, and San Marino, but the third place was not enough to progress.

This May, Dario Bašić's Croatia U-17 was in football focus due to being the host nation at the European Championships. Long-awaited appearance in front of the home crowd was completed following a narrow loss to Italy (0:1), defeat by Turkey (1:4), and an exciting draw with future champions Spain (1:1). Afterwards, Petar Krpan was appointed at the helm of U-17s, and in October the efficient national team played Albania, Liechtenstein, and always dangerous Spain to secure first place and progress to the Elite Round.

Croatia women and head coach Miletić have used the spring dates to successfully perform in a couple of friendly internationals. In autumn, they have embarked on a World Cup 2019 qualifying campaign. An excellent draw at Ukraine was recorded despite a red card, a valuable point was also won in Hungary, and the group favourites Sweden and Denmark met a tough resistance when playing Croatia.

Croatia national futsal team secured runner-up position and a play-off spot in the EURO 2018 qualifying tournament in April, facing hosts Ukraine, Belgium, and Montenegro. In September, France won a tense twolegged tie by the narrowest of margins and got the ticket to Slovenia. Furthermore, Croatia won an international friendly tournament in China in October.

RIJEKA'S HISTORIC SEASON, COMMENDABLE EUROPEAN PERFORMANCE

Domestic 2016/2017 season will be remembered by Rijeka celebrating the league title, the first in Croatian history. Under the leadership of Slovenian coach Matjaž Kek, Rijeka won on 27 occasions, alongside seven draws and two defeats late in the season - enough to top defending champions Dinamo by two points and to end their trophy streak.

LEAGUE/CUP 25[™] ANNIVERSARY

Croatian domestic competitions, First Division and Croatian Cup, have celebrated their 25th anniversary in 2017. Since 1992, Dinamo has won 18 league titles, Hajduk six, while Zagreb and Rijeka won one each. Cup trophy was lifted by Dinamo (14), Hajduk (6), Rijeka (4), Osijek (1), and Inter (1).

Bottom-placed RNK Split was relegated, while the ninth-placed Cibalia managed to avoid relegation through play-off matches against Gorica. Second Division champions Rudeš secured their debut promotion and joined the top tier.

Rijeka's cherry on top was the Croatian Cup success, including the victory in the Varaždin final over Dinamo. The Kvarner side won 3:1, and then embarked on the Champions League adventure.

In the qualifying rounds, Rijeka overcame The New Saints of Wales, followed by away goals triumph against Austrian champions RB Salzburg. Greek champions Olympiakos were too high an obstacle on the road towards group stage, but Rijeka continued in the Europa League. Finishing third, behind AC Milan and AEK Athens, and ahead of Austria Vienna, the farewell home victory over Italian giants was a special day for Croatian champions.

Dinamo Zagreb successfully took on Norway representatives Odd in the Europa League third qualifying round, only to be knocked out by Albanian side Skenderbeu. Hajduk Split eliminated Levski Sofia of Bulgaria and Brondby of Denmark, with the English powerhouse Everton ending their group stage hopes. The impressive run of Osijek included UE Santa Coloma of Andorra, Luzern of Switzerland, and famous Dutch PSV, while Austria Vienna clash proved costly.

Four Croatian clubs in the play-off round of UEFA competitions were an exciting achievement, said Croatian Football Federation president Davor Šuker: "This is a brilliant outcome, a result to remember! We really have to be proud of this success. Everybody deserves praise, from the players to the club management - well done to everyone who gave a contribution. We have witnessed Croatians' love of football, and how much their club's success means to them. Moreover, this was a confirmation of the Croatian clubs' quality".

In the Croatian Women's First Division, ŽNK Osijek continued the magnificent streak with 11th consecutive title, 21st in total, recording all 18 wins and unbelievable goal-difference of 157:2, leaving Agram at second and Split at third place. Mateja Andrić was the top goalscorer with 39 goals. ŽNK Osijek won the double in the Cup final against Trnava Goričan, and won second place in the Women's Champions League qualifying group in August, below Stjarnan of Iceland.

Nacional Zagreb won the domestic futsal double, and repeated European success in autumn, reaching the UEFA Futsal Cup Elite Round, a place among the best 16 continental teams. Nacional performed excellently once again, including a victory over former European champions, Dina Moskva.

FANTASTIC U-17 EURO: HNS MEETS BIGGEST ORGANIZATIONAL CHALLENGE

From 3 to 19 May 2017, Croatia hosted the U-17 European Championships, the biggest event Croatian Football Federation has organized since gaining independence.

"Over 43,000 spectators, exciting matches, great atmosphere in the stands and very good organization - it was a tournament highly rated among all the participants. It was an immense pleasure for UEFA to organize this tournament in cooperation with Croatian Football Federation", summarized UEFA general secretary Theodore Theodoridis following this fantastic event.

The best European youngsters have competed in Rijeka, Kostrena, Lučko, Velika Gorica, Sesvete, Zaprešić, and Varaždin, with HNS investing heavily in the renovation of the Varaždin Stadium, the venue for the final match.

In Varaždin, Spain celebrated winning the trophy after beating England on penalties following the interesting, tense 2:2 draw. Croatia U-17 team competed in Group A, losing by a single goal to Italy (0:1) and Turkey (1:4), then earning a point against the future champions (1:1) through a spectacular Čolina goal.

Amine Gouiri from France became the top goalscorer, and England, Turkey, Germany, and France - alongside champions Spain secured FIFA U-17 World Cup berth. Later in India, interestingly, England met Spain in the final match once again, but turned the tide and claimed the title.

Throughout the tournament, Croatian Football Federation has been promoting fans' positive values among the young supporters. Their idols, Croatia's Vatreni, have supported the entire project.

Scenes from Croatia have been broadcasted all over Europe - and the world - via Eurosport and Croatian Football Television. Over 200 media applications have been received before the tournament.

"I am proud that Croatia had the chance to host this European Championships. It was a wonderful experience. Croatia is my country, our country, and it was beautiful to prove we can accomplish such a mission, and make everybody happy", concluded EURO U-17 football ambassador, Niko Kranjčar.

THREE STADIUM EXAMPLES: CROATIA EXPERIENCES ESKIŞEHIR, KYIV, AND PIRAEUS

During 2017, the Vatreni have visited three beautiful stadiums, presented in detail in HNS website series "Introducing European stadiums".

In the beginning of September, Croatia was playing a tough away qualifier against Turkey at Yeni Atatürk in Eskisehir, a new stadium for 35,000 people, built in accordance with a major Turkish government project, under the supervision of Ministry of Youth and Sports.

The Turkish government invested 140 million lira (34 million euros) in Eskisehir stadium, that has been completed in October 2016. The minister Akif Cagatay Kilic highlighted the state's appreciation of the national sport:

"Investing 750 million euros in 26 world-class stadiums will change the entire sports scene. The new stadiums present efficient, long-term solutions that will open the door for thousands of supporters and create a sporting atmosphere, and include whole families and their friends. Together, we will develop football in Turkey. We build stadiums faster than other countries, and with less resources".

Only a month later, Croatia secured World Cup play-offs berth with a memorable win over Ukraine in Kyiv, at the magnificent Olympic Stadium that was renovated for the EURO 2012.

The Ukrainian government funded the project costing 450 million euros, and Kyiv is now proud of the second largest stadium in Eastern Europe, trailing only Moscow's Luzhniki. The new Olimpiyskiy NSC was opened in October 2011.

The roof was built in full, covering every seating position, and alongside other construction works, the stadium retained the possibility of hosting both football and athletics competitions. A five-star hotel was opened beside the stadium, and Kyiv was also chosen for the elite Champions League final in 2018. Finally, Croatia celebrated its FIFA World Cup ticket at Georgios Karaiskakis Stadium in Piraeus, that was built from scratch in 2003. The passionate Olympiakos supporters, not without reason, call it their temple.

As the owners, Hellenic Olympic Committee has enabled Olympiakos to use the stadium until 2052, through a contract passed in Greek parliament. Olympiakos has immediately invested 20 million euros, a third of the total cost (60 million euros). The remaining funds have been obtained through loans, and additional two million euros have been added in the closing stages. Moreover, Olympiakos is obliged to pay 15 percent of the stadium earnings to the state.

The New Karaiskakis has been built in just 428 days, in time for the Olympic Games in Athens, with the capacity of 32,115. UEFA has included it among 28 European five-star stadiums, and it can host the Europa League final.



STADIUM IN GUNJA BUILT, PITCH RENOVATION PROJECT STARTS

After four football grounds in Eastern Slavonia villages were renovated in 2016, small stadium in Gunja was finished in 2017.

Luka Šokčević Šaljapin stadium is the first stadium in Croatia built by Croatian Football Federation, thanks to FIFA and UEFA funds that were secured by HNS after the catastrophic floods hit Eastern Slavonia in 2014.

Stadium in Gunja will be a perfect model for other small stadiums in the country thanks to its great architectural solutions which will make the stadium the central place of population gathering in Gunja. Architects took care of many different details in order to fit the stadium in its surroundings, even using the bricks from the flooded houses as a reminder for the natural disaster that hit the region in 2014.

Stadium in Gunja is just the beginning of HNS investment in football infrastructure. HNS Executive Committee made a decision to start with a project of pitch renovation at First Division stadiums.

HNS officials held a meeting with representatives from city

municipalities and First Division clubs in order to present them with a project whose goal is to decrease the number of injuries, prolong the summer break and shorten the winter break, adjust the competition calendar to most European leagues, provide footballers with better playing conditions and giving fans and TV viewers a better "product".

HNS hopes to finish with this project

before the start of a new club season 2018/19. Croatian Football Federation will donate 3,500,000 kunas from UEFA hat-trick programme to each club in order to build a new pitch with hybrid grass, install a new drainage and heating system, and finance the first year of maintenance. Clubs are expected to finance project documentation, while cities are expected to fund sitedevelopment work before the project.



CHANGES TO HNS STATUTES

Croatian Football Federation held two meetings of the General Assembly. During the meeting in March, Assembly members accepted financial statements and yearly report for 2016, while traditional "Trofej podmlatka" awards were given to Željko Huber and Stanislav Vugrinec.

In June, Croatian Football Federation aligned its Statutes with the position of Central State Office for Sport. In addition to County Football Associations representatives, General Assembly will consist of the representatives from the First Division clubs, Second Division clubs, Third Division clubs, amateur clubs below 3rd Division, players' association, coaches' association and women's football.

"Today we aligned our Statutes with the position of Central State Office for Sport because Croatian Football Federation always respects state institutions. However, we will also always fight for football and sports in general, which includes legal solutions that help develop sport. Just like the rest of the Croatian sports family, HNS calls for the new and wide-ranging Sports Act that would be in the interest of all clubs, athletes, national associations and sports enthusiasts", said HNS president Davor Šuker, while adding:

"We will continue to fight for a better infrastructure, for better financing of sport and against every unlawful fan behaviour."

CROATIA FACES ARGENTINA, ICELAND AND NIGERIA



Moscow hosted the 2018 FIFA World Cup Final Draw, revealing Croatia's opponents for the next summer. Croatia was drawn from Pot 2, into the Group D, alongside top-seed Argentina, Iceland, and Nigeria.

Croatia is to open its fifth World Cup appearance against Nigeria in Kaliningrad (16 June, 21:00 CET), then faces Argentina in Nizhny Novgorod (21 June, 20:00 CET), and completes the group stage with Iceland in Rostov-on-Don (26 June, 20:00 CET).

Croatia head coach Zlatko Dalić offered his short analysis of the draw:

"It is an immense pleasure and honour just to be among the 32 best teams in the world, but Croatia deserves this. We have nothing to lose against Messi's Argentina, since they are one of the top teams and favourites to win the World Cup, and facing the best player in the world is a great challenge. Nigeria is young and strong, led by a German coach and undefeated in qualifiers. On the other hand, we know Iceland very well, and now we have the opportunity to respond regarding the recent Reykjavik defeat."

Big challenge awaits Croatia, said HNS president Davor Šuker:

"This is probably the toughest group at the World Cup, all teams are very much respectable. Moreover, what can we say about facing Lionel Messi, who can make a deciding move in any match. Nigeria remain a bit unknown, but for sure they have quality, considering their qualifying record. With Iceland we have certain qualifying experience and after the defeat in Reykjavik, maybe it's not bad to be drawn against them again."

CROATIA IN UEFA NATIONS LEAGUE TOP TIER

UEFA's new national team competition - Nations League - will start in September 2018, with Croatia among the elite teams in League A.

The UEFA Nations League is a new competition that aims to ensure the continued success of national team football by replacing most friendlies with competitive matches and by allowing all nations to play against equally ranked teams.

The first edition of Nations League, with all 55 UEFA associations participating, will be played from September to November 2018, following the World Cup in Russia. Croatia will compete in the top tier, League A, courtesy of UEFA coefficient upon the completion of European Qualifiers group stage.

Alongside Croatia, the League A consists of 11 remaining best European national teams: Germany,



Portugal, Belgium, Spain, France, England, Switzerland, Italy, Poland, Iceland and Netherlands. These teams will be drawn in four groups, on 24 January 2018.

The group winners will reach the Final Four tournament, to be played in

June 2019 and to determine the first Nations League champion, while the four third-placed teams will be relegated to League B. Likewise, lastplaced teams in Leagues B and C will be relegated, while group winners in Leagues B, C and D will be promoted.

UEFA PRESIDENT ALEKSANDER ČEFERIN VISITS CROATIA

European Football Federation president Aleksander Čeferin has visited Zagreb in the final days od 2016, as the guest of Croatian Football Federation.

Čeferin, who became UEFA president in autumn 2016, arrived to Croatia upon the invitation of HNS president and UEFA Executive Committee member, Davor Šuker.

UEFA president used the opportunity to visit Croatian Football Federation headquarters and later held a joint press-conference with president Šuker.

"I am glad that one of my first official visits is to our dear neighbours of Croatia. Croatia is a football phenomenon, a miracle on the field of play", Čeferin emphasized.



During his visit to Zagreb, the UEFA president was received by Croatian president Kolinda Grabar-Kitarović and prime minister Andrej Plenković, alongside state secretary for sport, Janica Kostelić. Čeferin was also greeted by HNS executive director Damir Vrbanović and HNS vicepresidents Đuro Bukvić, Ante Kulušić, and Ante Vučemilović-Šimunović.

JARNI TAKES OVER CROATIA U-19, KRPAN ASSUMES U-17 ROLE



Former Croatia internationals Robert Jarni and Petar Krpan embarked in June 2017 on their Croatia U-19 and Croatia U-17 campaigns.

Following the departure of Ferdo Milin to United Arab Emirates, Croatian Football Federation has appointed Robert Jarni as the new Croatia U-19 head coach.

Jarni is the member of the legendary Croatia generation that won bronze medal at the 1998 FIFA World Cup in France, and his playing career included the likes of Hajduk Split, Torino, Juventus, Betis and Real Madrid - where he played alongside current HNS president Davor Šuker.

"I am happy to have this opportunity to lead Croatia U-19 national team, since I have noticed many talented players here. This is an honour, and I seek notable success", said Jarni.

Petar Krpan succeeds Dario Bašić at the Croatia U-17 helm, following the European Championships U-17 final tournament in Croatia.

Among others, Krpan played for Osijek, Zagreb, Hajduk, and Rijeka in his homeland, and Sporting Lisbon, Uniao Leiria, and Jiangsu Sainty abroad. He was capped three times, and also won the '98 bronze, playing against Romania in the round of 16.

"Of course, I am overjoyed. It is a great honour for any coach to take over any national team", said Krpan.

USEFUL EXPERIENCE, NICE MEMORY, IVANUŠEC INTO HISTORY

In early January, Croatia national football team visited Nanning without superstars to play at the China Cup, facing South American champions Chile and host nation China. On both occasion, penalty shootout was needed to determine the winner.

In the semifinals, Chile took the lead through Pinares, with Franko Andrijašević scoring for Croatia on 77 minutes. Chilean goalkeeper Toselli later saved two Croatian penalties.

Third-place match brought success to China, with Luka Ivanušec breaking the deadlock, while Jingbin equalized (1:1) in the closing minutes. The woodwork and Chinese goalkeeper Xiaotian proved costly for Croatia penalty takers.

Ivanušec secured his place in his history books as the youngest ever Croatia's goalscorer. With 18 years



and less than two months, the Lokomotiva Zagreb midfielder did not hide his enthusiasm: "The feeling was difficult to describe. I am overjoyed".

Croatia head coach in Nanning, Ante Čačić, was very happy with the approach of his players: "Everyone did their best in both matches, trying to be a part of the team. They have performed well, and I regret only the fact they were not rewarded with a win. However, this will be a nice memory and a useful experience for all".

MEMORABLE CROATIA'S PREMIERE IN NORTH AMERICA



In late May, Croatia national football team has overcome Mexico 2:1 in a Los Angeles friendly international, turning one historic moment into a memorable success.

The first Croatia's match on North American soil after gaining independence was hosted by Memorial Coliseum, and Croatia internationals marked the occasion with quality performance, investing maximum effort in the victory.

Hajduk Split right back Fran Tudor was selected as the MVP. On 36 minutes, he assisted captain Duje Čop for the opener, and only a minute later Tudor punished Mexico's defensive mistake to make it 2:0. Following the Mile Škorić's red card, Mexico managed to reduce the gap in the closing minutes through Chicharito Hernandez.

In Los Angeles, Croatia enjoyed strong support from the stands, despite the majority of Mexico fans. Numerous Croatians in North America have seized this rare opportunity to cheer the national team, arriving to Memorial Coliseum from many different cities in USA and Canada.

"I am extremely proud of this match, since we have made a great number of Croatians very happy. I don't know how many people have told me during the previous days that this national team's visit means a world to them. It was beautiful to see players and fans celebrating together after the match. To our fans abroad, the national team is one of the strongest links with the homeland. Therefore, there was a lot of emotions in the stadium", said HNS president Davor Šuker.

"I would like to thank UEFA management, Croatian Football Federation, president Davor Šuker and former presidents, executive director Damir Vrbanović and former general secretaries, my colleagues and coworkers at HNS and other colleagues in European and Croatian football family for their cooperation and support which enabled my professional development, thus making it possible for me to be elected to this body", said Ivančica Sudac after her election.
