Dear friends of football,

Behind us is the most beautiful, most successful, and grandest year in the history of Croatian football!

For years, we had hoped and wished for our national team to repeat the unforgettable summer of 1998 and the bronze medal we had won at the World Cup in France. We believed in this generation, and we believed that they possess the knowledge, talent, and experience to stand their ground against the world's best teams.

However, even the biggest optimists among us could hardly imagine a more beautiful fairytale than the one we got to witness at the World Cup in Russia. It is my honest belief that playing in the World Cup final is the biggest success in the history of Croatian sports, but we will remember June and July of 2018 for more than just our incredible results on the pitch.

We will remember that the Croatian national team's football was more attractive and dynamic than that of any of our opponents - even in our loss in the final. We will remember the spectacular victory against Argentina, when we - along with the rest of the world - realized how far this team could go. We will remember the character, and the physical and mental strength that the team showed in the knock-out rounds of the tournament, coming out on top after early goals by their opponents in three consecutive matches. We will remember how Croatia overcame England in the semi-final of the World Cup.

We will remember the unprecedented sense of togetherness that this team first built in the locker room, then showed on the pitch and shared with the entire nation, where the euphoria rose with each win. We will remember that the Vatreni represented their country with joy, and that they won the hearts of the entire world and brought pride to Croatians everywhere.

Finally, we will remember the welcome that the team received in Zagreb, and in other cities around Croatia, where the public showed unparalleled love, pride, and passion towards the team. Football accomplished a beautiful feat – it united a nation and made Croatia the happiest place on Earth. That is the power of football; that is the strength of the Croatian national team!

I would like to take this opportunity to offer my congratulations to the entire technical staff, with head coach Zlatko Dalić at their helm - he was met with a difficult challenge when we entrusted him with the role of the Croatia head coach, and he used his calmness, communication skills, and training experience to make Croatia the world vice-champions. As always, HNS also did everything on our part to ensure that the team had the best possible conditions, and I hereby thank the members of our delegation for the effort and work that they put in during the entire World Cup.

Of course, most deserving of praise are all of our brilliant players, for each and every one of them did his part to make this success a reality. We would be remiss not to mention team captain Luka Modrić, who marked this football season and deservedly won all possible major individual recognitions. The World Cup Golden Ball and the numerous awards which proclaimed him the world's best football player speak of his football prowess and are a testament to the continuous hard work that he has done over the course of his career, though his teammates in the Croatian national team and in Real Madrid certainly also contributed to his success. Luka and our team brought Croatia an unseen amount of worldwide attention, and the benefits of this would be nearly impossible to state in financial terms. Croatia as the home of the world's best football player? Yes, it's possible!

But, most importantly, this medal will have positive repercussions for years to come. As our generation's bronze medal served as inspiration for the current team, so will today's stars inspire thousands of young football players all over Croatia. And as the silver medalists dreamt of outdoing the bronze medalists, so should upcoming generations dream of eclipsing this year's success.

The World Cup may be the most glorious story of this year, but it is certainly not the only one. Our U-21 team placed at the EURO U-21 for the first time since 2004 and thus confirmed that the future of Croatian football will be a bright one – and that Croatia will continue to be a force to be reckoned with, even after today's stars have made their departure from the team. The U-17 and U-17 teams brought yet more good news by

reaching the Elite Rounds of their respective European competitions.

Croatian club football also soared in 2018. After 49 years, Dinamo Zagreb has returned to the knock-out stage of a European club competition, following a defeat-free run in the group stage of the Europa League. We can only wish for such results to continue in the coming years.

I am proud that our successes did not end on the pitch. In 2018, HNS completed its project of renovating the pitches of first-tier clubs in record time – the new hybrid pitches cleared the road for better football, more goals, less injuries, and a much more engaging experience for players and fans of the Croatian First Division alike

The Annual Report that you have before you is testament to the breadth of HNS's activities, and the success of Croatian teams, and our many projects and activities – from our charity work to international affairs, licensing, finance, marketing, communications, education, our work with youth categories, and with football at the widest level.

Of course, we do not intend to stop at this – and we are fully devoted to continue with our success. If there is one wish for 2019 that we all collectively share, it is for the world vice-champions to receive a stadium worthy of their title. I believe that, after their result in Russia, we have witnessed the initiative and the desire needed for this project to come true.

I want to thank each person working in clubs, county football associations, our football centers, as well as HNS offices – without your skills, your energy and ambition, and the expertise and hard work that you contribute to Croatian football, our year would surely not have been this bright.

Let us maintain this tempo, so that we may have another year as excellent as this one.

After Croatia's debut at the World Cup in France in 1998, the whole of Croatia was quite certain that topping that historic bronze medal would be very, very difficult – perhaps even entirely impossible.

Zlatko Dalić and his Vatreni, however, begged to differ.

Only eight months after assuming his role as the head coach of the Croatian national team (who were at the time on the very verge of losing their ticket to Russia), head coach Zlatko Dalić led his players on a glorious adventure, which met its glorious end at the final match of the biggest football event on the planet, the FIFA World Cup.

The team's month-long stay in Russia saw Croatia become a symbol of togetherness, pride, and persistence. Not just for their fellow countrymen, but for football fans worldwide – with words of praise and congratulations coming from every corner of the world imaginable.

Naturally, there are no happy endings without the appropriate trials, and most importantly without the appropriate heroes: Modrić the Leader, Rebić and his uncompromising volleys, Subašić and his brave saves, the calm and collected Rakitić, the skilled Perišić, the unwavering Mandžukić, and the embodiment of team spirit in Ćorluka. There was also plenty of drama to be enjoyed - unexpected turnarounds, gripping chances in extended time, and penalty kicks galore. To even begin to name all of the moments which will undoubtedly

enter Croatian football lore seems an impossible feat.


"This summer was incredible, especially after seeing what this result meant for the whole nation. The players did something historic for themselves, for their people, and for the entire country. It will take a few years before the real scope of this result settles in, and before we understand how difficult and how exceptional it is for a country of four million to win two world cup medals in the space of two decades," said Dalić.

Tiny Croatia showed how great it could be when it was united under a shared goal.

Croatia played the World Cup final, while Germany, Brazil, Argentina, Spain, Portugal, and numerous other great football nations had long boarded their flights back home. The world cheered on the boys in the checkered jerseys, while Messi, Ronaldo, and Neymar could but watch the final on television. When the Vatreni played Luzhniki Stadium for the World Cup final, Croatia was at shades away from becoming the home of the world champions.

The general public concurred that Croatia's football players had brought the country long-unseen amounts of optimism and enthusiasm, and had set an example that could be applied to many spheres of public life. For one month in the summer of 2018, Croatia was truly the happiest place on Earth.



### There are truly no words...

This is not a day that will go down in the history of Croatian football – this is a day that will go down in the history of Croatia, period. The nearly inconceivable number of people who lined the streets and the sheer joy and national pride which they displayed make the team's welcome in Zagreb one of the most memorable days in recent Croatian history.

The World Cup was over, and Croatia - tiny Croatia, with its four million inhabitants - had reached the very end of it. The ending of the tournament saw Croatia exhale after a month of gripping matches – but the momentary respite was followed by growing excitement. The Croatian team was to receive "an unseen welcome". The news predicted "a full national square". After witnessing the welcomes of the bronze medalists, of Janica Kostelić, and of Goran Ivanišević, this generation of football players would receive what they had always dreamed of - a welcome of their own.

Yet even in their wildest dreams, they could not have dreamt up the Welcome. They could not have possibly imagined – no one could have – what Croatia had prepared for its heroes.

Adorned with silver medals, an under-slept, worn group of fifty-something passengers on the Croatia Airlines flight from Moscow to Zagreb perked up when they were greeted by two MIG planes upon entering Croatian airspace. Text messages begin to trickle in, bearing photos of the Main Square and of the streets of Zagreb – but the real shock came when the team disembarked the airplane.

Could there really be this many people on the landing strip already? Could so many fans have really come to greet the team here in front of the airport? Is it really possible that a crowd of this unimaginable size had gathered in Buzin? With every coming turn and crossroads, the disbelief grew – had there always been so many people living here? As the bus left the airport, its could have been outpaced by a slug or a turtle - so slowly was the bus moving through the crowds that the players joked that "in four hours, we still won't be to the city center". And they weren't - it took the team a total of six hours to reach the Main Square. The sheer ridiculousness of this can only be grasped when one realizes that the same route could be crossed on foot in three and half

It was incredible to see the exchange of positive energy between the players and the people who had gathered on the streets to greet them. The mass of ecstatic fans shared their energy with their 22 heroes; the players thanked them with their songs and their joy as they celebrated on the bus. There is hardly an item that did not somehow make its way into the team bus as a present. The crowd threw flags, tshirts, hats, and scarves; they also threw bras and assorted foods. The most coveted resource, however, was an external phone battery everyone aboard the bus wanted to film these unbelievable scenes that the rest of the country hadn't yet witnessed, and that they themselves would surely not witness again in their lifetimes.

The eyes of the fans showed that the hours spent waiting for the bus to pass through their street had been worth it, that they were happy to be part of this moment, that they were proud at what the team had done for their whole country, and that they wanted nothing more than to see in person the men whose efforts had brought them joy for the past month.

It's difficult to believe that grandmas in their seventies and eighties stood among the crowds and waved at the national team with tears in their eyes. People brought their month-old babies to greet the team; they climbed the traffic light and traffic signs; they walked for miles along with the bus, waved from rooftops and waited in the July heat for hours.

Each street brought yet more new, delirious faces. Somewhere around the University Library, it became unclear whether the bus would be able to turn into Vukovar Street. Then it was yet more unclear whether it would ever make its way to Savska Street – and could it possibly go through Savska Street and reach the Main Square? There were more people in front of the National Theatre than the previous day's news reports had estimated would come to the Main Square.

When the bus reached the Main Square, it was the icing on the cake of the entire trip from the airport. Hunger, thirst, the hours spent waiting for this moment – even the rain – could not ruin the brilliant, unforgettable atmosphere. The boys may have lost their voices, but the fans hadn't. With song and with cheering, the crowd celebrated the biggest success story in the history of Croatian sports – and an exceptional, unforgettable day came to an end.

## LUKA MODRIĆ SIMPLY THE BEST

The captain of Croatia's silver medalists and midfielder of reigning European champions Real Madrid is the undisputed star of the past football year.

Luka Modrić continued his streak of club successes as one of the key players to wear Real Madrid's jersey this season, and his impressive performances led the Vatreni to the very final of the World Cup, the most important match on the planet.

For his successes, he had received numerous individual recognitions, and he continues to receive them in the last weeks of 2018, with the crowning jewels of his collection being the impressive feat of winning a prestigious trio of awards: UEFA Men's Player of the Year, The Best FIFA Men's Player, and the Ballon d'Or. His list of achievements is rendered even more impressive when marketing viability is taken into consideration, as this only confirms how far ahead of his peers he was on the pitch.

"It's unreal that the best player in the world comes from little Croatia, and that's why we should all be proud of our captain, who has shown us all that, with hard work and sacrifices, dreams can come true," said experienced defender Vedran Ćorluka.

"This year it was a privilege to watch Modrić," said one of the world's best players of all time, iconic Brazilian Pele.

"An incredible season of an incredible player," said Modrić's Real Madrid teammate Gareth Bale. Congratulations for Modrić arrived from all corners of the world – and members of the football family weren't the only ones impressed.

Special congratulations for winning the Ballon d'Or arrived from Croatia President Kolinda Grabar-Kitarović, and she was joined by the likes of Marin Čilić and Novak Đoković.

Reactions from Modrić's teammates in the national team and in Real Madrid were especially emotional, and his claim at all of this year's prestigious individual awards is given additional relevance by the fact that Modrić – who has travelled a long road from his beginnings as a child refugee to his star turn as an elite football – had ended a decade-long domination by Ronaldo and Messi on the awards circuit.

"It was a fantastic year and all of Modrić's awards are well-deserved," said legendary Ronaldinho, and his compatriot Ronaldo sent additional words of praise.

"All of Luka's awards are also a testament to his teammates and his coaches in the national team and in Real Madrid, and they are a point of pride for all of us in Croatian football who can now pride ourselves on having produced the world's best player, in addition to many other excellent players. Luka's football style, his competitive spirit, humility, and work ethic make him a great inspiration for future generations. Let us hope that the next Luka is hiding among them, but for now - hats off to our captain, the best in the world!" said HNS president Davor Šuker.

In the words of head coach **Zlatko Dalić**, **Luka Modrić** is simply the best.

I will remember this year for the rest of my life; if I could have planned it myself, I wouldn't have been able to come up with something this glorious. It's truly a great honor and a wonderful feeling to hold this trophy, and I want to thank everyone who has supported me along the way. My teammates from my club and from the Croatian national team played an important part in helping me get here. I am happy that Croatia has been recognised as a football superpower, now to an even greater extent than ever before.

Less than a month after winning the silver medal at the FIFA World Cup in Russia, Vedran Ćorluka said his goodbyes to the national team and the checkered jersey in an emotional letter to fans

Born on February 5, 1986 in Derventa and known for his excellent technical abilities, the diverse defender started his club career in Dinamo Zagreb (with a brief loan spell in Inter Zaprešić) and won four domestic trophies. In 2007, he moved to Manchester City and made his Premier League debut, before moving to Tottenham Hotspur, where he would remain for four seasons. His English days were followed by a short loan to Bayer Leverkusen, after which he departed for Lokomotiv Moscow.

With Lokomotiv, he won the title of Russian champions and two domestic cups, as well as becoming the team captain. His efforts were recognized through two important individual awards: Player of the Year (as chosen by Lokomotiv supporters), and the "Vatrena Krila" award, by fans of the Croatian national team.

Ćorluka started his international career in 2002, as "a 16-year-old-kid overjoyed to have the opportunity to defend Croatian colors at least this one time in the youth categories". His debut in the youth team, however, would be far from his last time playing for Croatia – he wore the checkered jersey a total of 145 times, with 103 of those matches being at the senior level. Ćorluka earned his first cap for the senior team in a

2006 friendly win against the newlycrowned world champions Italy. During his long national team career, he scored on four occasions: against Qatar, Turkey, Estonia, and Macedonia.

Croatia vice-captain Vedran Ćorluka retires from the national team with more than 100 caps and as one of Croatia's best defenders, leaving behind a legacy of persistence, perseverance, and team spirit.


Despite his youth, Ćorluka became a key element in Croatia's defense under head coach Slaven Bilić, and he made a major contribution to Croatia's memorable success in EURO 2008 qualifiers, when Croatia topped Russia and left England empty-handed at Wembley. Ćorluka was equally important at the final tournament in Austria/Switzerland, with Croatia winning all three group stage matches and then losing to Turkey in dramatic circumstances. "We all felt that match against Turkey deeply," Ćorluka said, remembering his tears after this disappointment.

Another disappointment came when the team failed to reach the 2010 FIFA World Cup in South Africa. In the qualifiers and successful campaign at the EURO 2012 Poland/Ukraine, however, Corluka was irreplaceable. He developed into a natural leader on the pitch and made vital contributions to Croatia's game at the 2014 FIFA World Cup in Brazil, at EURO 2016 in France, and at the 2018 FIFA World Cup in Russia.

His burning desire to see Croatia's potential fulfilled, after unfortunate losses to Spain, Mexico, and Portugal, has finally been realized this summer. "I had the privilege, luck, honor and the reward – I don't even know how to name it – to experience this summer in Russia." With a silver medal on his neck, and still on the tails of a one-month fairytale, he could close this chapter of his life with his head held high and his dreams a reality.

A leader both on the pitch and off of it, he will be remembered as one of the key members of the World Cup team that achieved the highest result in Croatia's football history. Ćorluka embodied team spirit with his humble approach, best seen as he celebrated his 100th cap by coming off of the bench in added time against Argentina. "Ćorluka set a standard with his example – no individual can be more important than the team," head coach Dalić said of Ćorluka.

And though he was the poster child for putting the team first, he also showed the impact that an individual can have, and as time passes, we are bound to see just how positive and lasting of an impression Vedran Ćorluka left on the team and on Croatia supporters.





# #ThanksMandžo

Mario Mandžukić's career as a Croatia international has come to a close after 11 years, 89 appearances, and 33 goals – and the tireless forward from Slavonski Brod is sure to go down in Croatian football history as a symbol of relentless fighting, running stamina and determination.

He made his first football steps in Ditzingen, Germany; early senior-level performances at Marsonia and Zagreb secured him a place in Dinamo Zagreb's roster, where he won not only domestic trophies, but also awards for the best goal-scorer and the best player of the Croatian First Division.

In 2010, he moved to Wolfsburg to prove his quality at the Bundesliga level, and was quickly recognized by Bayern. In his first season in Munich, he won the treble, becoming the first Croatian player to score in the Champions League final.

Next he joined Atletico Madrid, and a year later he opted for a transfer to Juventus, winning three domestic doubles in a row, and playing in another Champions League final against Modrić and Kovačić's Real Madrid, where he scored UEFA's goal of the season – a beautiful overhead kick. "His running, technique, and tactical understanding are incredible. He is a top-class striker", explained Juventus coach Massimiliano Allegri.

Following appearances in the youth categories, his senior debut came under the leadership of Slaven Bilić, in a 2007 friendly against Macedonia. He scored

his first goal in his second appearance in a 2010 FIFA World Cup qualifying match against England in Zagreb.

Mario Mandžukić bids his farewell to the Vatreni as the second-best goal-scorer in Croatian history – and as a symbol of always putting the success of the team first.

Mandžukić gave an important contribution to Croatia's successful EURO 2012 qualifying campaign, including a goal against Turkey in the play-offs. In Poland/Ukraine, he scored a brace against the Republic of Ireland and a goal against Italy, and became one of the highest goal-scorers of the entire tournament. He was also acknowledged as the Croatian Footballer of the Year, Sportsman of the Year, and was awarded the supporters' "Vatrena Krila" award. "He just flies on the pitch", summarized head coach Bilić.

Confirming his status as one of Croatia's key players, he was efficient in the 2014 FIFA World Cup qualifiers, scoring two valuable goals against Serbia, one against Wales and one against Iceland in the play-off return leg, when he was also sent off. In Brazil, he scored a brace in the group stage against Cameroon.

A special place in the fans' collective

memory of the EURO 2016 qualifiers is reserved for his goal against Italy; also memorable is his hat-trick in a 2018 FIFA World Cup qualifier at Kosovo. A mere three days later, he scored the winning goal against Finland.

As Croatia went on to win the silver medal, Mandžukić was a clear first choice as a striker against Nigeria and Argentina in the group stage. Against Denmark in the Round of 16, he scored the equalizer, only to mark his final two matches for Croatia with more goals: an extra-time winner against England in the semifinals, and a goal in the World Cup final itself, against France.

However, not even the moments of greatest glory could distract him. "I'm here to do whatever it takes for the team, regardless of my position. I keep my head down, I work, and the most important thing for me is to emerge victorious. It doesn't matter if I score", Mandžukić was clear.

Still, he retires as the second-best alltime Croatia goal-scorer, behind Šuker (45), and ahead of Eduardo Alves da Silva (29). With a silver medal around his neck, he can look back with pleasure at matches played in his favorite jersey.

"We have made our dreams come true, achieved a historic success, and experienced unbelievable fan support. That month, including the welcomes in Zagreb, Slavonski Brod, and the rest of Croatia, will remain the single most important memory of my career", said Mandžukić upon closing his international chapter.





## **#ThanksSuba**

Shortly after the announcements of Vedran Ćorluka and Mario Mandžukić's international retirements, 33-year-old Croatia goalkeeper Danijel Subašić also confirmed his withdrawal from the national team after two full campaigns – EURO 2016 and the 2018 FIFA World Cup.

Subašić made his debut for the senior national team in November 2009, in a Vinkovci friendly against Lichtenstein. During Stipe Pletikosa's era, he earned several more caps in friendlies, and he finally made his competitive debut against Malta in September 2014, at the beginning of the team's road to

Conceding goals on only five occasions, Subašić joined in on the celebrations as Croatia secured final tournament berth, and proceeded to save a penalty by Sergio Ramos as the Vatreni managed to defeat the reigning champions Spain. He also contributed to a tough, but successful qualifying campaign for the World Cup in Russia, where he deservedly became one of the nation's heroes.

Subašić was capped in victories against Nigeria and Argentina in the group stage, and then saved three

attempts by Denmark in the decisive Round of 16 penalty shootout, repeating Ricardo's record-breaking effort from Germany 2006.

However, this was not the end of Subašić's heroics. Several days later, in the quarterfinals stage, the Russian tournament hosts failed to score two more penalties as Croatia's goalie paved the road towards a magnificent clash with England in the semifinal. This time, his fantastic intervention denied Kane from scoring a second goal for England and allowed Croatia to come back and secure a place in the World Cup final.

In the end, France claimed the title – but Croatia brought home the historic silver, courtesy of Danijel Subašić and the rest of the Vatreni. Suba could therefore end his international career with his head held high.

"There is nothing to regret, we have to go home feeling proud. We managed to bring joy to people of Croatia, and they rarely have something to be happy about. It's not a small thing to be second best," he stated.

Suba – who will also be remembered for his energy, his charisma, and his contributions to keeping team spirit high – will continue his club career at Monaco, where he has already won the first and second division titles, alongside individual awards for the best goalkeeper in France. Though his usual role is to keep opponents at bay, he has also managed to score a goal for Monaco, from a free-kick against Boulogne.

Before departing to Monaco, Subašić played for Zadar and Hajduk, winning the Croatian Cup at Split. From his hometown and his youth, he preserved a friendship with tragically deceased Hrvoje Ćustić - Subašić wears a shirt with his name at every match.

"We can fully rely on Danijel Subašić," said former Croatia head coach Niko Kovač when Subašić took over from Stipe Pletikosa. Suba proved him right - and more.

# A YEAR OF GREAT OPPONENTS

The national team's historic year will go down in memory not only for the glorious silver medal, but also for a long line of matches against excellent teams – even outside of the World Cup.

The team's first challenge came on its US tour in March, when the Vatreni played ambitious Peru (0:2), who were especially hungry for victories ahead of their return to the World Cup. Four days later, Croatia internationals played another friendly – this time with the well-known Mexicans. Rakitić's penalty goal ensured a 1:0 victory for Croatia.

As part of the team's preparations for the World Cup, the Vatreni headed to Liverpool to meet the ultimate football nation – Brazil (0:2); their final test ahead of their flight to Russia came in a close win over Senegal at Gradski Vrt Stadium in Osijek (2:1), made possible by the goals of Perišić and Kramarić.

Autumn brought yet more exciting matches, starting with a friendly match against current European champions Portugal. Both teams left Faro without a win (1:1). The Nations League calendar left space for another friendly match, this time on home turf; goals by centre-backs Vida and Mitrović brought Croatia a win against Jordan (2:1).

The main spotlight was, of course, on the newly-established UEFA competitions, with the Vatreni competing in League A against England and Spain. Despite a rough start (a 0:6 loss in Elche), Croatia internationals managed to stay in the running for the top spot with a tie against the Three Lions (0:0) and a gripping win against Spain (3:2). The Maksimir spectacle against Spain proved to also be the perfect occasion for the Croatian audience to greet the world vice-champions in their first competitive home

game since the World Cup – and the Vatreni did their best to keep the audience entertained, with Croatia taking the lead twice (Kramarić, Jedvaj), Spain evening the score both times (Ceballos, Ramos), and unexpected hero Jedvaj bringing victory for the home team with a goal in extended-time. Three days later, Kramarić took the lead against England at Wembley, and Croatia seemed the winner of its group – but the English managed to get in two worthy goals and earn the top spot (1:2), which sent Croatia to League B.

The Vatreni's tumultuous time in the Nations League did not diminish their reputation on the world scene. The football world followed Croatia through its multiple matches against former world champions from South America (Brazil, Argentina) and other ambitious Latin teams (Peru, Mexico), against strong African football nations (Senegal, Nigeria), and against Asian representative Jordan. Croatia's list of European opponents is no less impressive, including former and current world champions in the biggest match on the planet (France), the reigning European champions (Portugal), the undisputed rulers of football in the 2008-2012 era (Spain), and three matches against the eternally special team from the very birthplace of football (England). No less exciting were tense matches against crowd-favorite Iceland, enduring Denmark, and enthusiastic Russia.

In 2018, fans of the Vatreni had the unique opportunity of watching their heroes play against some of the biggest names to ever enter the pitch – Messi, Neymar, Griezmann, Mbappe, Kane, Ramos, and many others. Through it all, Croatia made one thing clear – their place among the world's football elite is more than well-deserved.





Croatia played 10 games with former or current World and European Champions in 2018 - three times against **England**, two times against **Spain** and once against **Brazil**, **Argentina**, **France**, **Portugal** and **Denmark**.





In 2018, the Croatian national team set its new record for number of matches played in one year.
In addition to seven games at the FIFA World Cup, Croatia played six friendly games and four games in UEFA Nations League.

Five players had their national team debuts in 2018: Karlo Bartolec, Duje Ćaleta-Car, Josip Brekalo, Antonio Milić and Marko Livaja.

# THE YOUNG VATRENI EARN THEIR TICKET TO THE EURO, GOOD NEWS ABOUND IN YOUTH CATEGORIES



"We have reached our first key goal of placing at the EURO, and now it is time for us to prepare as best as we can. We must use this opportunity and we want to play the best football that we can; I think we have a team with a lot of potential. The expectations are great, and we want a good result, especially after our great run in the qualifiers," said head coach **Gračan**.

The Croatian senior women's team ended their road in the qualifiers for the FIFA Women's World Cup with their best score to date – a 1:1 draw against current European champions Denmark, with coach **Mate Prskalo's** women in the lead until extended time. This result comes as a bright end to the effort they have put in during the qualifying cycle, in which they achieved two more ties at way matches against Ukraine and Hungary.

Croatian men's U-17 team met with Sweden, Belgium and Cyprus in Elite Round during spring 2018 and did not manage to qualify for the final tournament, but had a successful autumn by qualifying for another Elite Round in a group with Armenia, Andorra and Italy. Croatia U-19 was likewise successful in earning their place in the Elite Round, thanks to a win against Luxemburg (2:1), and ties against Macedonia (1:1) and the Czech Republic (2:2) in November.

Nedelišće and Ludbreg hosted Group 1 in the qualifiers for the European Women's U-19 Championship, with Croatia meeting England, Slovakia, and Malta. Croatia U-17 (W) fought their way to the final of the Gallini Cup in Italy, and also hosted the qualifying tournament for Group 2 for the EC, winning against Israel (1:0).

With head coach Jakov Ungarov at the helm, Croatia's women's fustal team played a strong qualifying round for the EC - though they scored two wins against Slovenia and Sweden, they ultimately did not go through to the final tournament, due to a loss against group favorite Russia. The men's futsal team won an international tournament in Hungary with wins against Slovakia and the Czech Republic, as well as a draw against the tournament hosts. Dario Marinović was named best player of the tournament, while **Žarko Luketin** took the award for the best goalkeeper. In September, head coach Stanković and his team met England in an away match, which was broadcast live on the BBC.

## DINAMO ZAGREB RISES AGAIN

After a triumphant 2016/2017 season for Rijeka, Dinamo returned to previous form and once again claimed both the title of champions and the Croatian Cup. This is the Blues' 19th time coming out on top in the Croatian First Division, and their 15th time winning the Croatian Cup. Dinamo can also pride themselves on having the highest-scoring player of the championship in El Arabi Hillal Soudani, who scored 17 goals in First Division matches. With 73 points at the end of the season, Dinamo came out ahead of Rijeka (70) and Hajduk (66); in the Cup final, the Blues defeated their perennial rivals from Split (1:0). Ahead of this rendition of the Croatian Derby in Vinkovci, the local stadium underwent

considerable renovations, and the final match itself was a part of the inaugural Days of Croatian Football in Slavonia.

The manifestation also included the final matches of the Youth Cup, held in nearby Ivankovo. Dinamo U-15, Hajduk U-17, and Osijek U-19 triumphed, while the title of champions in the youth leagues was claimed by Dinamo for all three age groups.

The Blues' U-19 squad was successful in their first two rounds of the UEFA Youth League against

Dinamo successfully overcame Hapoel Beer Sheva and Astana, but their road to the Champions League was cut short by

The Blues truly shone in the group stage and stood their ground against strong opponents; Fenerbahce, Anderlecht, and Spartak Trnava. The Croatian champions achieved four consecutive wins in the first four rounds and ensured that they would place first in their group with a tie in Istanbul – but the Zagreb boys have no plans of stopping there...

"I am certain that we will continue to do well in the remainder of the Europa League and that we will show that club football, like the national team, can also contribute to the excellent reputation of Croatian football in Europe and the rest of the world," said HNS president Davor Suker

Along with Dinamo, three more Croatian clubs tried their luck in the Europa League. Osijek eliminated Moldavian Petrocub and was subsequently eliminated by Glasgow Rangers; Hajduk was successful against Slavia Sofia, but were unable to beat Romanian FCSB; Rijeka was stopped short by Norwegian Sarpsborg.

For the first time in history, Novo Vrijeme Apfel from Makarska won the title of Croatian futsal champions, thanks to a victory against Split Tommy in the final round (3:1). Their win ends a three-year domination by Nacional Zagreb, and was also the start of their successful European spell. The club hosted the Main Round and secured three victories against Kampuksen Dynamo, TBC Tbilisi, and Aktobe - thus placing among the 16 best teams on the continent. Further in the competition, they faced Benefica, Sporting, and Russian Sibirjak, which is sure to be a priceless experience for the club's further development.

Novo Vrijeme Apfel of Makarska won their first title of Croatian futsal champions and made a successful first run in European competitions by placing among the 16 best teams in the UEFA Futsal Champions League.

# HNS RENOVATES FIRST DIVISION PITCHES

While the Vatreni were making a splash on the pitches of Russia in the summer months of 2018, HNS was equally busy off the pitch, with the Croatian FA renovating the pitches of a number of first-tier clubs.

New pitches were built at the stadia of Inter Zaprešić, Istra 1961, Slaven Belupo, Dinamo, and at Kranjčevićeva Stadium, which is used jointly by Lokomotiva and Rudeš. Though initial planning also included Vinkovci Stadium, this part of the project was abandoned, as local club Cibalia was relegated to the third tier of Croatian football competitions.

This infrastructure project was initiated at the end of the last competitive season by HNS, as part of a joint effort with UEFA. All of the newly installed

pitches are hybrid pitches, which combine natural and artificial grass. In addition to this, Kranjčevićeva Stadium also received new seating and renovated sanitary facilities; the opening of the new areas was also attended by Zagreb mayor **Milan Bandić**.

Total investments into renovation and maintenance of pitches:

"I would like to thank HNS for their investments in football infrastructure, so that the next Modrić, Mandžukić, and Rakitić may train and play our beloved sport of football," said **Bandić**.

Construction of the pitches was done by Italian companies Rappo S.R.L. and Italgreen S.p.A., who were chosen at the end of an international search for suppliers. The positive repercussions of installing the new pitches have been visible in the first half-season already, especially as clubs neared the winter break.

"This has been the biggest project of HNS since its independence. I want to thank everyone who has supported this endeavor – the pitches are beautiful, and were also very much a necessity. We did a great job and I hope we will continue with our infrastructure investments in the future," said HNS director of competitions and infrastructure Marijan Kustić.

# HNS PREMIERES DAYS OF CROATIAN FOOTBALL

Days before Croatia's final friendly match ahead of the World Cup, "Hrvatski Dom" Theatre in Vukovar hosted HNS's inaugural edition of the Formal Evening of Croatian Football, at which the season's most prominent individuals received the HNS Trophy. The event was also attended by mayors of Vukovar and Osijek Ivan Penava and Ivica Vrkić.

The title of Best Croatian Footballer went to national team captain and member of current European champions Real Madrid Luka Modrić, and the award was presented to him by HNS president Davor Šuker.

"Thank you to everyone who voted for me – I am glad to be the first recipient of this award. I hope this will become a tradition for many years to come," said Modrić.

**Luka** was also honored by the Foundation of Women in the Croatian War, while HNS and its "Vatreno Srce" Foundation made a donation to **Josip Milković**, the son of a Croatian war veteran who had suffered serious injuries during a military exercise in 2016 – and for whom the €160 000 donation would cover the purchase of several orthopedic aids. "We will always be available to those who need us," stressed HNS director of competitions and infrastructure Marijan Kustić.

Croatian generals presented head coach **Zlatko Dalić** with a replica of the Croatian flag that had flown on the Knin Fortress. "We will do our best to do the Croatian people proud. We are ready, and we are capable of greatness," said **Dalić**.

"In these moments, I can vividly remember 1998, when I played with the Vatreni in France – the most important thing was to wear the checkered jersey and hear the sounds of the Croatian anthem," said president **Šuker**.

The award for the best youth player went to **Lovro Majer** of Lokomotiva, while the title of best player in the Croatian First Division went to Dinamo's **El Arabi Hillal Soudani**.

Dominik Livaković was proclaimed the league's best goalkeeper, and Rijeka's Matjaž Kek took the title of best coach. Domagoj Drožđek of Varaždin was named the best player in the Croatian Second Division, the award for best female player went to Iva Landeka, and Dario Marinović was named best futsal player. The award for the best referee in the Croatian First Division went to Ivan Bebek.

HNS's television partner HNTV also organized crowd's choice awards for best goal and best save of the 2017/18 season – Karlo Letica of Hajduk and his save against Rijeka were named the best save of the season, while Petar Bočkaj took the crown for the best goal. The League's best 11 included Dominik Livaković, Borna Barišić, Zoran Nižić, Dario Župarić, Josip Juranović, Arijan Ademi, Filip Bradarić, Lovro Majer, Hillal Soudani, Heber Araujo dos Santos and Mirko Ivanovski.





# **ŠUKER CONFIRMED FOR ANOTHER TERM:**HNS'S DAILY OBJECTIVE IS TO CARE FOR STATE OF CROATIAN FOOTBALL

At the very end of 2017, Zagreb's Sheraton Hotel housed an electoral meeting of the HNS Assembly, at which incumbent president **Davor Šuker** was confirmed for another tenure at the helm of the FA. Šuker is to remain president until 2021, and his second term was supported by 48 members of the Assembly.

"I am excited because we know how important continuity is in football. During our time on the pitch, we learned the fundamentals of team work. The past several years have been a successful time for Croatian football. This is the result of our joint efforts, and I believe it will form the basis for our activities over the next several years," said Suker after the vote.

Among guests at the Assembly were UEFA vice-president and president of the German Football Association Reinhard Grindel, UEFA's director of national associations Zoran Laković, representative of the Croatian Olympic

Committee Siniša Krajač, representative of the City of Zagreb Ivica Lovrić, and honorary HNS presidents Branko Mikša and Mladen Vedriš.

Congratulations for **Šuker** also arrived from FIFA president **Gianni Infantino**. "I wish you and your team a lot of luck, strength, and success, so that you may handle all future challenges," wrote **Infantino**.

At the next meeting, held in April, the Assembly confirmed reports on the workings of the Executive Committee and other bodies in 2017, as well as confirming the final financial report and the auditor's report for the past year.

The HNS Youth Trophy was also awarded to four deserving individuals: Stjepan Benić, Milan Đuričić, Jozo Pirić, and Rudolf Krznarić (posthumous), while Ante Pavlović – who had served a near-continuous 62

years in the executive bodies of the Croatian FA – was named honorary general secretary.

"The daily objective of HNS is to maintain Croatian football's place among the world's elite. This would not be possible without the excellent work of individuals in numerous bodies and sectors of the FA, such as licensing and finance. Of course, this also includes our football sector, all of our clubs, and county associations," said president **Šuker**.

"I invite you to join me in working on the promotion and improvement of Croatian football. I believe that everything we do needs to be aimed at young football players, and at ensuring that they have the best possible conditions for growth and for participating in football," said UEFA representative Ilker Ugur, while also stressing that he considers Croatia to be one of the big success stories of European football.





In November, Zagreb's Westin Hotel hosted a formal benefit for the "Vatreno Srce" Foundation, at which significant means were raised for charity projects which benefit children.

The funds collected at the dinner will be used to buy equipment for Zagreb Children's Hospital and for the "Korak u život" (Step into Life) Foundation, which helps secure higher education scholarships for youths without parental care.

In addition to the charity dinner, funds were also raised through a callcenter, with Croatia internationals and members of the coaching staff and delegation picking up the phones; the team was also joined by other celebrities from the world of film, music, and sports.

"It's wonderful to see so many well-

known faces, and especially to see former national team coaches – they are all still very much a part of the Vatreni. We want to continue spreading unity, both on the pitch and off of it. Let us all show how strongly our hearts beat, as we did on July 16," said coach Dalić.

"In these years of the Foundation's activity, we have done our best to benefit the health and growth of children. I want to thank all of you for your contribution," declared **prof. dr. Josip Paladino**.

One of the members of the Foundation's Managing Board is the world's best footballer **Luka Modrić**, who announced his happiness at participating in the fundraiser: "I am happy to continue the tradition of Niko Kovač and Darijo Srna in the Board. It is only fitting for the captain of the national team to be involved in the

working of the Foundation in this way, and I consider this my duty as captain. I am proud of the years we have spent helping children, as we are most touched by youngsters' plights."

The benefit was also attended by HNS president **Davor Šuker**, with the dinner proving an opportunity for a reunion with his fellow bronze medalists, including coach **Miroslav Blažević** and **Igor Štimac**.

"Let us use the power of football to ensure a better future for young generations, so that children who want to be the next Modrić have all the conditions that they need to achieve their dreams. The work that's being done by the Foundation tonight is incredibly important – when a man sees children in a hospital, it's easy to solve all other problems," said Šuker.







# HNS OFFICIALS ABOUND IN FIFA AND UEFA

In February of 2018, the 42<sup>nd</sup> Ordinary UEFA Congress met in Bratislava, and HNS's delegation at the event was led by president **Davor Šuker**, who also serves on the UEFA Executive Board.

HNS's Head of International Affairs and Licensing **Ivančica Sudac** also

represented the Croatian FA internationally when she was chosen as the first woman to serve as delegate at the final match of a UEFA men's competition. Her pioneering appointment came at the final of the Europa League in Lyon, when **Vrsaljko's** 

Atletico Madrid confidently beat Olympique Marseille (3:0). **Sudac** is also the first Croatian national to serve as delegate at the final of a UEFA men's club competition.

"This appointment is truly a big recognition of my work so far, and I am





very grateful to my colleagues in UEFA and in HNS for supporting me through all these years. Serving as a delegate in the final match of a club competition is an exceptional honor for every football official, and for me this has additional and special worth, as I was entrusted with being the first woman to serve as a delegate at the final of a men's competition," said **Sudac**.

This success by a Croatian official comes as no coincidence, which is confirmed by the large number of Croatian officials working in various bodies within UEFA and FIFA.

Along with his position on the Executive Board, HNS president **Davor Šuker** also serves as chairman of the

UEFA Football Committee and deputy chairman of the UEFA Marketing Advisory Committee, as well as being a member of the Organizing Committee for FIFA Competitions. Executive director **Damir Vrbanović** is a member of the UEFA National Team Competitions Committee, while **Ivančica Sudac** is the first vice-chairwoman of the UEFA Club Licensing Committee and a member of the FIFA Audit and Compliance Committee.

Since July of 2018, **Sreten Ćuk** has also served on the UEFA Development and Technical Assistance Committee, while **Zoran Cvrk, Zoran Bahtijarević, Boris Durlen** and **Vladimir Iveta** have terms in UEFA committees until 2019.

Zoran Bahtijarević, Ante Vučemilović-Šimunović and Miljenko Sakoman also take part in the work of expert panels.

Croatia also has five representatives among UEFA football delegates, as well as four futsal delegates, seven referee observers, two doping control officers, security officer Miroslav Marković and technical instructor Boris Kubla.

In addition to this, **Ivan Novak** serves as the FIFA instructor for futsal refereeing, while **Lada Rojc** has the corresponding post for women's football – both are set to occupy these roles until 2021.





# ANOTHER TRIUMPHANT CLUB SEASON FOR CROATIA INTERNATIONALS

In 2018, Vatreni alumni had another successful run in the Champions League, with Luka Modrić and Mateo Kovačić achieving their third consecutive title with Real Madrid. Victory for the Spaniards came after a final match against Dejan Lovren's Liverpool in Kiev – goals for the victors were scored by Benzema and Bale, while Lovren assisted Mane in scoring Liverpool's only goal (3:1).

Modrić played the full 90 minutes for Real Madrid, with Kovačić among the reserves. The duo have continued Croatia's lucky run of having at least one player in the team winning the UCL every year since 2013, starting with Mario Mandžukić's claim at the title with Bayern – next were Modrić and Real in 2014, a short interjection by **Rakitić** and Barcelona in 2015, and three consecutive wins by Real Madrid.

"Winning the title of champions is special each time, but this third title in a row has special meaning to it. We are happy and grateful for our fans' support – we have written history," said Vatreni captain **Luka Modrić** in one of the most unforgettable moments of his career.

Right-back **Šime Vrsaljko** also won the first major European title of his career with his Atletico Madrid, whose win over Olympique Marseille brought them the Europa League trophy. **Vrsaljko's** Atleti beat the French team through two goals by **Griezmann** and a goal by **Gabi** (3:0). Vrsaljko started for

Atleti and played the first half of the match. In addition to this European trophy, he has also won four domestic Croatian championships and claimed two Cup titles, all with Dinamo Zagreb.

"I will always remember this feeling and I hope that this will not be my last experience of this kind," said **Vrsaljko** after this match. Winning this title proved to be the perfect way for **Šime** to say goodbye to Madrid, as he signed for Italian Inter in the summer.

Though **Šime** was not in Madrid to play the UEFA Super Cup, Croatia can still boast of having a player with the title – recent Atleti signee **Nikola Kalinić**. Atletico beat their city rivals Real Madrid in a 4:2 win in Tallinn.





With its second UEFA GROW award for Best Engagement Campaign, the Croatian Football Federation once again confirmed its top spot among European FAs in the field of digital communications.

"These awards are like 'Oscars' for the development of football in Europe. The excellent projects shown here are a testament to how far we have come in growing football, and I want to congratulate the winners for their creativity, passion and effort," said UEFA's director for national associations **Zoran Laković**.

Among 106 projects from 44 FAs, UEFA selected three projects per category to be presented at the UEFA GROW conference in Riga. HNS's digital strategy (#Family), which had guided the Croatian FA's coverage of the national team in Russia, was presented by project authors **Tomislav Pacak** and

**Nika Bahtijarević.** The project also received the support of team captain **Luka Modrić** via a video message in the presentation.

Based on the application materials and the presentation, an independent jury of academic and professional experts awarded the Croatian project as the best in its category.

"HNS's authentic campaign is excellently thought-out and does a great job of connecting football and family, while also telling the stories of the national team players and their families and creating a positive atmosphere around the team," explained jury member Nikki Symmons.

The digital campaign was implemented without the help of external agencies. Along with the project leader, spokesperson **Tomislav Pacak**, and co-author **Nika Bahtijarević**, the project was also

executed by journalist **Borna Rupnik**, photographer **Drago Sopta**, and graphic designer **Nikša Martinac**.

#Family served as the guiding thought for all of HNS's digital activities. The FA focused on publishing content and statements which stressed the importance of family values, such as unity, trust, friendship, closeness, and cooperation.

Thanks to excellent collaboration with and input from the national team, who showed their willingness to connect with the general public and their good sense of humor since the first day of team preparations, the great atmosphere from the locker room was shared with the public and the media. 

we consider that clubs which are not stadium owners have increased costs due to the investments in assets that are not owned by the clubs


in general, we are satisfied with the application of the club licensing system

Leagues are uninteresting even to local sponsors, which don't see any interest in club financing, and sporting wish to advance to higher level of competition leads only to higher costs for the club without any increase in profit, which is supposed to come with higher level competition. Being that most clubs in Croatia are amateur clubs, HNS should stimulate such sporting success.

Club licensing is not in harmony with the conditions and state in which we operate. The process is more suited for Austria or Switzerland.

Everything is more or less clear, the only problem is in the fulfilment of the criteria without the HNS support.









#### **CROATIAN CHAMPIONS ACROSS EUROPE**

Croatian footballers played important roles in their clubs during their Championship and Cup wins across Europe.
